Snow Event Documentation

Dear [Redacted]

The AQD has reviewed the fourth quarter 2009 Ambient Air Monitoring Network report submitted by [Redacted]. In this report [Redacted] claims PM10 data on December 25th and 26th, 2009 was influenced by blowing snow and states that data was invalidated for those dates. The report offers the following definition of a snow event, "A snow event occurs when high winds drive snow into a monitor's inlet, affecting the sample and causing it to report erroneous concentrations," and goes on to state, "The determination to invalidate data is based both on evidence of a snow event in the collected data and on information provided by mine personnel."

The following are noted in [Redacted] quarterly submission as data indicative of a snow event:

- a) drastic changes in filter loading,
- b) high concentrations followed by large negative concentrations
- c) temperature faults.

And the following are noted in [Redacted] quarterly submission as information which may be provided by mine personnel:

- d) pictures during the storm,
- e) pictures of the inlets with snow/water in them,
- f) pictures of the filter showing moisture damage,
- g) written weather observations, such as a blasting report.

As noted in [Redacted] snow event appendix, "the determination to invalidate data is based both on evidence of a snow event in the collected data and on information provided by mine personnel." No data indicating a, b or c was submitted with [Redacted] quarterly report.

In order for the AQD to concur with the invalidation of the data, data indicating drastic changes in filter loading, high concentrations followed by large negative concentrations and/or temperature faults on the dates to be invalidated should be submitted for review within 30 days of the date of this letter.
